

Wife Refuses to Sell Husband But Names Rival to Win Divorce

Court Told of Rival's Cash Offer for Mate

The errant spouse, Charles W. Frink, disappeared from his home in Norwich, Ct last year (1929), and later was discovered living in the summer home of the widow, Mrs. Hazel Ulmer, according to Mrs. Frink's testimony. The summer home is at Point Judith, an exclusive seashore colony not far from swanky Newport.

"When I approached this summer home early in the morning of Oct. 24 last, my husband and Mrs. Hazel Ulmer fled from it," the wife, Rose Frink, said on the witness stand. "I pursued in my automobile and finally came upon Hazel Ulmer, alone. I asked where my husband was, and Hazel told me: He's not feeling so well. When he saw you were catching up with us, he left me and hid in the bushes." "Then Hazel Ulmer told me she loved my husband and intended to have him, and asked me how much I would take to settle everything quietly."

Mrs. Rose Frink turned down the offer and filed a \$100,000 suit for alienation of affection. But, before her divorce action came to trial, she accepted a settlement, said to be \$30,000. Her attorney, George C. Morgan, did not ask for alimony in today's proceedings, and none was granted.

1. Recap: The suicide that made Mrs. Hazel Ulmer a widow occurred when her husband, Mr. Henry Ulmer, a millionaire leather manufacturer and a prominent church leader, shot himself through the heart not long before the public revelation of his wife's affair with Mr. Charles Frink.

2. A \$30,000 alienation suit was filed against Mrs. Rose Frink by Mrs. Helen Antzis, the wife of Mr. Michael Antzis, Charles Frink's partner in the dairy business. The suit was dismissed when Michael Antzis explained that he was out with Mrs. Frink at 3 a.m. only to help her secure divorce evidence.

3. A suit for divorce by Mr. Michael Antzis against his wife, Helen Antzis, with an unnamed co-respondent is pending.

4. A receivership for the Frink Antzis Dairy Company is pending. It is said to have been necessary because both parties were so busy litigating the matrimonial war that they neglected business.

5. Although Charles Frink admitted at his divorce trial that he was the rich widow's house guest at her Point Judith summer home, he denied at that time that he would marry her when Rose Frink won her freedom. Rose Frink also received custody of her son, Charles Jr.
